FIRST CCBES CERTIFICATE CLASS ADMITTED

Last fall the Goodwin-Niering Center for Conservation Biology and Environmental Studies introduced its new Certificate Program with the goal of enhancing the undergraduate academic experience with emphasis on environmental issues. Designed to allow students in any major to focus their liberal arts education in the environmental realm, the program helps prepare them for a ten-week internship during the summer following the junior year. Students must also complete an independent study or honors thesis during the senior year, attend a conference on environmental issues and make a public presentation on their senior project. They will participate in a special two-year Certificate Seminar designed to help prepare them for their internships and senior projects.

Starting in fall, 2000, eight juniors will be entering the program as the first CCBES Certificate class. All have developed certificate proposals specifying their

core courses and describing their internships. They have also outlined the goal of their senior integrative project. Proposed internships include field research in marine biology, ethnobotany applications, policy studies of rivers, economic impacts of environmental issues and cultural ecology.
